There are 14 main areas to consider. Respond to each statement made, scoring yourself between 1 and 5, based on this scale:

1 = very poor

2 = poor

3 = average

4 = good

5 = very good

Note that similar statements will appear in more than one area; this is because the issue affects multiple areas.

1. Did Your Players Have Fun?

Statement Rating: 1–5

The practice and playing environments were positive and enjoyable.

I effectively organized practices.

My players learned the skills they needed to be competitive.

My players experienced individual successes in practices and games.

I doled out playing time appropriately.

I reinforced players' competence and helped them see positive aspects of their performance.

I didn't overemphasize winning.

2. Did Your Players Learn New Skills and Improve on Previously Learned Skills?

Statement Rating: 1–5

My ability to teach skills enabled my players to learn what they needed to learn.
